

## **BLYTH TOWN COUNCIL**

### **ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE SERVICE PLAN 2021/22**

The primary aim of this Service Plan is to identify the key priorities for the service in 2021/22 and to show how those activities contribute to the delivery of the Council's Mission Statement:

#### **MISSION STATEMENT**

Blyth Town Council is committed to participating fully in the development of a vibrant and growing community that will encourage business and community activity.

#### **ROLE OF THE COUNCIL**

- To promote the environmental, social and economic wellbeing of the town and its community.
- To provide high quality core services in the most effective and efficient manner which will deliver the Council's agreed priorities and objectives.
- Provide leadership and be a voice for the community in all matters which impact on the town and the community.
- To work in partnership locally and regionally to meet common goals and outcomes.

#### **Terms of Reference – Environment Committee**

The Committee will be responsible for the management, research and development of the following areas in accordance with Council policies, Standing Orders and Financial Regulations.

Day to day management of all assets e.g. play areas, allotments, open spaces, litter bins, bus shelters, flower beds and the enhancement of those services within the contract with the County Council and any other relevant contractor.

The Committee will consider and agree service standards for services within the contract and amend the contract subject to any budget requirements, so that they are consistent with the Council's priorities and objectives and provide best value for money.

The management and delivery of the Northumbria in Bloom and Blyth in Bloom competitions.

The annual consideration of priorities and objectives in relation to the services provided by the Town Council as well as other partner organisations and to recommend any changes in those priorities.

To work in partnership with relevant bodies and organisations in delivering the Council's strategic objectives and outcomes.

Preparation of an annual service budget, both capital and revenue, with proposals over a three-year period, which reflect the Committee's strategic objectives and priorities, and submitting these proposals through the Governance Committee within a timetable to enable the Council to set a fixed budget and agree a precept within the statutory guidelines.

To deliver those services in accordance with the approved budget.

To agree service action plans on service standards and outcomes to be achieved in line with its approved budget.

To monitor and review those action plans and budget performance at each committee meeting and report to the Council through the Governance Committee.

### **Powers delegated to the Town Clerk:**

The Clerk shall be delegated to undertake the day-to-day management of all assets within the Committee's Terms of Reference e.g. these will include:

- Management of playgrounds and open spaces.
- Day to day management of the partnership arrangements with Northumberland County Council and other contractors.
- Let allotments, serve notices to cultivate or terminate allotment tenancies on breach of any tenancy conditions.
- Draw up a management plan for the maintenance, repair, development and improvement including proposals for charges to tenants for each of the allotment areas which will be presented to the Committee for consideration on an annual basis.
- Collect all fees and charges in connection with allotments and undertake debt recovery action in accordance with Council policies and procedures.
- Liaise with the allotment holders and their associations and to arrange any consultation or meetings with the Committee in order to ensure their participation in any proposals with regard to the allotments.

## Annual Budget 2021/22

The annual budget for this committee is shown at Appendix 1. The Council also look for other funding and grant opportunities.

### Description of Assets and Work Carried Out

Allotments:

The Council are responsible for 12 sites, 6 of which are managed by agreement with 2 allotment associations.

Where sites are managed on the Council's behalf, the associations allocate, inspect, serve termination notices, and collect monies due. For this work they receive 25% of the income due.

Bus Shelters:

The Council are responsible for 91 shelters.

CCTV:

The Council have installed CCTV systems in 11 Play Areas and in the Market Place in accordance with Council policy and have 7 deployable cameras to cover areas of concern e.g. anti-social behaviour.

The Council have officers who are authorised to view the images from these systems, should they so be required in line with our registration with the Information Commissioner.

Litter Bins:

- The Council are responsible for 450 bins.

**Play Areas:**

- The Council are responsible for 17 areas.

**Public Seats:**

- The Council are responsible for 126 seats which may increase during the year as a result of Committee approvals.

**War Memorials:**

- The Council are responsible for 4 memorials. These are in Ridley Park, Cowpen, Newsham and Elfin Walk.

**Inspection Regimes:**

An agreed inspection regime is in place for each type of asset based upon an evolving risk managed process. Shown in the appendices attached, 2 to 3, are examples of the templates used for the work carried out on each visit as well as the planned programme of visits to satisfy the Council's

responsibilities, appendix 4. These programmes reflect the work of both the Council and NCC.

With regard to the inspection work carried out by Blyth Town Council officers, the target is 100% and we have once again achieved this.

The inspection regimes include inspecting NCC work in accordance with the elements of the Partnership Agreement. These inspections will be recorded electronically on an application called Total Mobile and will be sent directly to Senior Managers and Team Leaders at NCC. The results of these inspections will also be included in the Partnership Weekly progress report which is forwarded to BTC. BTC Officers have programmed into the Service Plan to carry out a minimum of 3 Partnership weekly inspections in each of the 3 designated areas across the Town.

Once each inspection has been carried out the respective documents are completed, where necessary photographs taken and works orders issued. These are then stored in the appropriate folder on the Council's shared drive.

On a weekly basis a summary of all inspections carried out is circulated to Councillors.

After each inspection is carried out records are also updated which show performance management figures.

The inspection work also includes where contractors are employed for specific work.

### **NCC Partnership Agreement 2019-2024**

This agreement which commenced in April 2019 covers an enhancement to the core services delivered within the town.

NCC have a workforce dedicated to work within the town and their main responsibilities are:

The weekly inspection and cleanliness of play areas, maintenance of open spaces, emptying litter bins, monthly cleaning of bus shelters, cleaning of public seats, upkeep of flower beds and the enhancement of those services within the contract.

A Partnership Working Group of Councillors and officers from the 2 Councils is also in operation.

Within the Partnership Agreement there are a list of services provided and the frequency of carrying out these.

This is the third year of this new agreement and we are still experiencing the difficulties that the Coronavirus situation has brought, albeit it much

less than last year thankfully. At this stage NCC are still carrying out all aspects of the partnership agreement although certain operational and organisational tasks have been revised for health and safety reasons. All seasonal staff are in place. NCC did extremely well in providing continued services throughout last year.

NCC will provide the normal updates for circulation and the officers will be working closely to highlight where there may need to be operational changes considered.

### **Environmental Enforcement**

The Council has a Service Level Agreement with NCC to provide an enhanced enforcement service within the town with the addition of 1 full time equivalent officer.

### **Priorities 2021/22**

The Committee has agreed a plan to date for this year in which the outcomes will help fulfil our vision for Blyth and for those who wish to live, learn, work and play here, whilst ensuring the area is served by a constantly improving Council.

The Council will focus on the delivery of a specific set of projects over the next year. These priority projects have been determined, alongside managing the day-to-day delivery of core services. Council officers through a variety of processes e.g. inspections carried out, proactive work and feedback are able to provide ideas and initiatives to the Committee.

It is recognised that although projects are planned and agreed that because of circumstances that prevail these plans may need to be reprioritised. The service needs to be responsive to circumstances as they see fit.

The inspection regime for the early part of 2021/22 across all assets and identified areas are being carried out in line with the inspection programme.

These projects listed below are in addition to the work we carry out within the Partnership Agreement in enhancing the town:

#### Allotments:

No projects have been confirmed at this time, but we are monitoring the situation and should projects be identified these will be brought to the Environment Committee.

#### Bus Shelters:

A cantilever style bus shelter will have to be reinstalled on Plessey Road following a hit and run where the bus shelter was completely destroyed and had to be removed in 2020.

#### Litter Bins:

Work in this area continues to be monitored to ensure that adequate facilities are available for the public and that suitable collection facilities are in place.

Fabrication work commenced early May 2021 on 3 decorative bins. When completed they will be installed on the Quayside area in locations which are currently occupied by Derby Double E bins - these will be relocated to other sites in Blyth.

#### Seats:

Two seats have been supplied by Councillor Potts in memory of his wife and Town Councillor O Potts who passed away last year.

Two additional seats have been ordered from Ogilvie's in recognition of the amazing work that the NHS staff have carried out during the pandemic. When these seats arrive, we will be removing two seats on Broadway Circle which will go back into stock, the NHS seats will be installed in place of them.

#### Play Areas:

##### Broadway

Committee have previously agreed to this scheme and we have sought permission to relocate the play area approximately 20 metres from its present location. The shape of the play area is the same but larger and will give a greater range of equipment, it includes specific equipment for wheelchair users.

The Council sought competitive quotations for this scheme and Play & Leisure Ltd were the chosen contractor at a cost £52,000.00 which is the budget we had set initially. We also sought separate quotations for paving and for the fencing and the most competitive quotations were received from Play & Leisure Ltd.

#### Speed Sensors:

The Council manage 10 Speed sensors within the Town and share this information with the Police and NCC Highways where enforcement in problem areas can be carried out. Monthly data is also available to view on the Blyth Town Council website. The number of speed sensors will be

increasing to 16 as 6 are being supplied by County Councillor J Reid from his MLIS.

### Town Centre Schemes:

#### Bowes Street (BTC/NCC Scheme)

This Scheme has now been included within the Northern Gateway Scheme and the Bowes Street element is Phase 1 of the project. The original scheme that was drafted by Northumberland County Council has been changed significantly and the new design includes new surfacing incorporating coloured block paving. The amount of parking has been increased within the scheme and designated cycle lanes are also incorporated into the lay out. The street furniture will also be changed to encourage people to gather and sit and relax, the street lighting is of a different design specification which will allow for festive lighting to be strung between the columns.

Officers are in the process of obtaining further information.

#### Sculpture x 4

Councillor Webb has requested two sculptures to be fabricated. The first "The Last Shift" was installed in May 2021 as a lasting memorial to the former Isabella Colliery in the Isabella Ward which he was the County Councillor and Town Councillor.

The second is a last memory for the staithes and the maritime history of the River Blyth and when fabrication is completed will be installed at the Quayside near to the Commissioners Quay Hotel.

Councillor S Davey is having a sculpture fabricated to reflect the ship building industry on the river and this will be installed on the bend between Regent Street and Hodgson Road, known as Shipyard Corner, when Planning Permission is granted.

Councillor G Davey is also having a sculpture fabricated on a mining theme to be located on the grass area opposite Asda when Planning Permission is granted.

#### Seasonal Bedding and Planters

The varieties of herbaceous plants in the beds around Broadway Circle have been removed and the beds are being planted with varieties that will give more colour in the summer months.

The centre of Broadway Circle will be planted with shade-tolerant plants to create a woodland scheme, incorporating varieties to give more colour to the area.

The wildflower beds along Rotary Way have all been resown and additional beds have been added along Broadway field.

### **Summary of Work in 2020/21**

During the last year, our main achievements were:

#### Inspection Regimes

Improving the inspection regime and documentation.

The agreed inspection regime was in place for each type of asset based upon an evolving risk managed process. The inspection regime for 2020/21 across all assets was carried out in a different way during the pandemic. Allotments and Play areas were visual inspections for a vast majority of the time but the inspection regime was completed over the course of the pandemic.

The inspections carried out included inspecting NCC work in accordance with the elements of the Partnership Agreement. BTC Officers were introduced to recording works carried out by NCC Core and Partnership teams on a handheld device in early May 2019. These inspections were recorded electronically on the Total Mobile Application with inspection reports sent directly to Senior Managers and Team Leaders at NCC. The results of these inspections were then included into the Partnership Weekly progress reports forwarded to BTC. BTC Officers then had scope to carry out a minimum of 3 Partnership weekly inspections across each of the 3 designated areas across the Town.

#### Tree Planting at Meggie's Burn and other locations

Almost a year since our popular community tree planting event on the stretch of grassed area between Links Road and Meggies Burn, the Town Council purchased a further 1,500 trees to extend the planting which was carried out by our Partnership Team.

A mixture of maple, cherry, hawthorn, hazel, pine, rowan and oak have been added to the stretch planted in 2020. A wildflower mix has been sown to enhance the biodiversity of the area.

NCC have overseen the planting and locations for the native trees and the fruit trees for the Precinct Planters to go in the Town Centre and along the Quayside. Additional Precinct Planters and Tower Planters have been purchased to be placed in other areas of Blyth.

#### Seats

New seats were installed on the entrances to Walton Avenue, and opposite Sure Start.

Two seats to commemorate VE Day were funded by Cllr Webb from his MLIS and fabricated by Blyth Bespoke Fabrication and they were installed on Elfin Walk.

### Play Areas

The refurbishment and layout of the Ogle Drive Play Area was started later than expected because of Covid 19, the contractors started in September 2020 and all works and the additional exercise equipment which was funded by both Cllrs J & O Potts was completed and opened in October 2020. The name of the play area has now been changed to the Olga Potts Play Area at Ogle Drive.

### High Street Car Parks Scheme

The High Street project was advertised on the Government Portal and the contract was awarded to NCC within a DSO. Prior to the Coronavirus pandemic the shrubs and trees were removed in preparation for the necessary hardscapes to commence however the project was not programmed to be started prior to the pandemic. Work actually commenced in January 2021 to remove the wooden planters and carry out the resurfacing work which is still to be completed. New light columns are to be installed in mid-May 2021, the additional resurfacing work will be completed following installation.

### Allotment Rents

The invoices for the annual rents in 2020/21 should have been posted to tenants the second last week of March for payment in April. Due to the Covid-19 situation the Town Council decided to hold the issue of invoices. It was felt that sending out invoices might unnecessarily add to the pressure of the circumstances felt by many. However, after receiving requests from a number of tenants to pay their rent, the decision was made to issue invoices in July 2020. Payments were received by BACS, electronically and a number by cheque as tenants were instructed no cash payments would be accepted due to the closure of the office.

### Allotment Projects

The installation of a barrier agreed committee has been completed at the Bolam Site and additionally the agreed surface stabilisation agreed by committee on the car park area at South Farm Allotments has also been carried out and completed.

### Bus Shelters:

The 2 stone bus shelters located on Princess Louise Road and Newsham Road were demolished in January 2021 and replaced with the new style

seen throughout the town. The new shelters were delivered and installed in early February 2021.

#### Litter Bins:

Over the course of the year, we have installed 25 new bins in various locations around Blyth and we continue to look at new locations and where it is practical to install them.

#### Bulb Planting/Wild Flower Mix

Additional bulb planting was carried out in two locations in late October last year around Cowpen War Memorial, Cowpen Road and opposite little Asda. An additional area along South Newsham Road has been sown with a pollinator mix.

#### Additional Planters

A total of 10 tower planters have been purchased along with 8 precinct planters for the High Street project. These will replace the wooden beds that have been removed and will give the area a lift of floral colour from the tower planters and fruit trees and additional bedding in the precinct planters.

Planters and precinct planters have also been purchased in readiness for the completion of Bowes Street albeit that project now looks to be sometime away. The 6 precinct and 4 tower planters will be planted up the same way as the other planters, they will now be located in other areas of the Town Centre and Quayside.

The present Quayside planters are being replaced with 3 Promenade Planters and these will be filled with appropriate coastal plants which are better suited to withstand the environment where they are located.

#### Poly Tunnel

NCC had room at Stakeford for an additional polytunnel which is funded jointly by NCC and BTC to accommodate the bedding for all the additional planters. This will also help to produce plants of a stronger and better quality which will produce better floral displays in the various planters. Additional resources have also been agreed with NCC to facilitate the maintenance of these once in situ.

#### Market Place/Elfin Walk Sculpture

Following the Planning Permission being approved the sculpture was fabricated and finally installed in October 2020 on behalf of Councillor K Nisbet and Councillor G Davey.

### **Use of Web Site**

The web site is used to promote/provide updates on the services we carry out and allow the public to provide the Council with e.g. information, requests for service and complaints etc.
